

EXAMPLE: YOU SHOULD FINISH PRACTICING.

#### LINKING VERBS

State of Being Verbs + More

am be was are being were is been feel look taste smell become sound seem grow appear stay remain

EXAMPLE: THE COOKIES TASTE YUMMY.

\*Coordinating Conjunctions combine 2 independent clauses (FANBOYS)

examples: for, and, nor, but, or, yet, so

Prepositional Phrase: a group of words consisting of a preposition, its object, and any words that modify the object
